

# Msgr. Stephen Jensen appointed Bishop of Prince George



On January 3, 2013, Pope Benedict XVI appointed Msgr. Stephen lensen, Vicar General of the Archdiocese of Vancouver, as Bishop of the Diocese of Prince George. He succeeds Bishop Gerald Wiesner, OMI. who, after over 19 years, offered his resignation to the Holy Father in Jun 2012 when

he reached the age of 75, as required by the Code of Canon Law.

Bishop-elect Stephen Jensen was born May 30, 1954 in North Vancouver, BC. He attended St. Peter's Seminary in London, Ontario where he received his BA in Philosophy in 1976 and a

Master of Divinity in 1979.

He was ordained a priest of the Archdiocese of Vancouver on May 24, 1980. From 1984 to 1998 he was a pastor in three parishes: Immaculate Conception and Corpus Christi in Vancouver and St. Ann's in Abbotsford.

Since 1984 he has served on the Catholic School Board, overseeing a total of 46 elementary and secondary schools in the Vancouver Archdiocese. He was named a Prelate of Honour in 1996 and Vicar for Education in 1997, assisting with elementary and secondary Catholic schools, as well as adult catechesis.

In 2001 he earned a doctorate in Education, specializing in educational leadership, at the Jesuit University of San Francisco. In 2009, the Most Rev. J. Michael Miller, CSB, Archbishop of Vancouver, named him Vicar General of the Archdiocese.

He has also been Moderator of

the Curia and Vicar for Evangelization and Education, a member of the Archdiocesan Finance Council, Chair of the Steering Committee of the archdiocesan annual appeal, and a member of archdiocesan advisory boards for Catholic cemeteries, evangelization, stewardship and vocations

Bishop-elect Jensen was a trustee of Vancouver College and St. Thomas More Collegiate schools – both non-parochial high schools originally run by the Christian Brothers – and a member of the board of the theological school St. Mark's College and the undergraduate liberal arts program Corpus Christi College – both affiliated with the University of British Columbia.

He was a trustee of Providence Health Care, the largest Catholic health care organization in Canada.

Shortly after his appointment as bishop of the Diocese of Prince George, Msgr. Stephen Jensen made a brief trip to the diocese to meet with his new staff at the Diocesan Centre. 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### Tíreless priest moves north

Msgr. Stephen Jensen grew up serving the Church and he's never stopped.

The Bishop-elect of Prince George has always kept service and obedience to the Lord close to his heart. His friends and collogues know he will bring that attitude to the people of Northern British Columbia.

"It's all God's grace, not our personal abilities," he told *The B.C. Catholic.* "We can't be under any illusions on where it comes from."

The archdiocese's vicargeneral knew he wanted to serve Jesus relatively early in his life. Growing up in North Vancouver in the 1950s and 1960s, he attended Holy Trinity Church with his parents Kathleen and Mark (both deceased) and studied at Holy Trinity Elementary School.

"In those days North Vancouver was like a small town," he recalled. "It was much less developed than it is now, so you recognized a lot more people you saw on the street."

It was a close-knit community. Parish life, he added, was a great influence on him. He saw "the Church at its best."

"In that parish there was a great tradition of service," he said. "Altar boys would serve in large numbers at weekday masses. It was just part of growing up there; it wasn't seen as exceptional."

He said this was probably where the "seed of vocation was planted." He also credited his parents for being good examples of how to be faithful Catholics.

"Church was very important to them, and the priest-hood was revered." He said his parents didn't hinder him from the priesthood but didn't put any pressure on him.

"The family sets the framework for your world; if family life is conducive to faith and vocation than it's possible to hear the call."

Bishop-elect Jensen, as he will be known until his episcopal ordination, was also influenced by his pastor Father John Kilty, who inspired him to serve God's faithful.

Once Bishop-elect Jensen decided to pursue the priest-hood he was sent by former Archbishop James Carney to St. Peter's Seminary in London, Ontario. He obtained a master of divinity degree in 1979.

"I thoroughly enjoyed St. Peter's," he recalled. "The priests and seminarians were really fine people."

He said his class of seven seminarians was a tight-knit group. "It was remarked at the seminary that that the class was an extraordinary one because we really all were friends and, I would like to think, a positive influence."

One of his classmates, now Bishop Brian Dunn of Antigonish, NS, will be on hand at Bishop-elect Jensen's ordination Mass.

Bishop Dunn described his friend as a solid, insightful, firm and reliable man. "In the seminary he was very quiet, but whenever he spoke you got to the core of the truth he was talking about. He had a wonderful way of penetrating the reality of the situation."

Bishop Dunn said his for-

mer classmate's mastery of catechesis and religious education will not only be a great contribution for the people of Prince George, but also for the entire country when he becomes a member of the Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops.

Bishop-elect Jensen returned to Vancouver in 1980 and was ordained by Archbishop Carney. He was assigned as an assistant pastor at Corpus Christi Parish in Vancouver and later at Assumption Parish in Powell River.

From 1984 to 1998 he served as pastor at Immaculate Conception and Corpus Christi parishes in Vancouver and St. Ann's in Abbotsford.

"The good people were always inspiring and edifying to priests," he said.

He had the chance to work for four "outstanding archbishops," he added, from Archbishop Carney to Archbishop I. Michael Miller.

He was named a prelate of honor with the title monsignor in 1997 and in 2009 Archbishop Miller appointed him to his current post as vicar-general.

The bishop-elect appears to keep somewhat to himself and maintain a certain level of privacy but his coworkers within the chancery know him as a witty man with a sense of humor and a good heart.

Bishop-elect Jensen will face his new appointment with humility and a reliance on the Lord. "It's not going to be my abilities or skills that do it; it's only by God's help. We're not sufficient ourselves, but God is." SPECIAL EDITION Page 3

## "Catholic education equips us for mission"

Bishop-elect Stephen Jensen served education in the Vancouver Archdiocese as a member of the Catholic school board and currently sits as vice -president.

"Catholic education, in a school or parish setting, is really a continuation of the ministry of Jesus, so we can know and respond to God's goodness to us," he said. "It equips us for mission, to be witnesses so that others may come to know and serve God, too, in the family of the Church."

In 1997 Archbishop Adam Exner, OMI, appointed him vicar of education in the archdiocese. At the same time he earned a doctorate in education leadership from the Jesuit University in San Francisco.

"He's a wonderful vicar of education," commented Bobbi Duncan, office manager of the Catholic Independent Schools office of Vancouver Archdiocese. "He always has the schools as his first priority. He's a wonderful man and Prince George is lucky to have him.

Together they elected Father Richard Beaudette, OMI, to the position. Bishop Wiesner's resignation be-

came effective on January 5, 2013 when the Holy Father appointed



Msgr. Stephen Jensen as bishop of the Diocese of Prince George. At this time both the Council of Priests and the office of Vicar General cease to exist.

To ensure governance of the diocese during the time between the appointment of a bishop and his ordination and installation, canon law requires the Consultors meet to elect a Diocesan Administrator.
