### Imitate God's mercy in caring for most vulnerable

PRINCE GEORGE - In Easter week Pope Francis announced a "Jubilee of Mercy" beginning on December 8th, the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception. This Holy Year is gift to help us grow in appreciation of God's merciful ways and implore pardon for the Church and the world.

The deterioration of our social world highlights the need for God's mercy in our lives and community.

Canadian courts have struck down protection of human life in one case after another. The unborn are without any legal protection and now the law against physicians aiding their patients in committing suicide has been swept away.

We need to implore God's mercy on our country, especially its elected leaders who make laws and the media that present the ethical issues that confront us. The "culture of death" is entrenched in the circles of power and influence. Only God's mercy can deliver us from this spreading evil.

The government has been given a year to draft new legislation addressing end-of-life issues. As citizens and people of faith, we need to be well informed about what's at stake so that our voices can help shape the future, ensuring respect for life and care for those at the end of their earthly journey.

Palliative care is a medically and morally sound way of assisting the dying.

The diocesan website (www.pgdiocese.bc.ca) has resources that present the issues accurately and counter the misleading propaganda that lobbies public opinion to impose an ever wider culture of death on us. These resources also suggest practical steps we can take to exercise our role as citizens to improve society for all.

Our Lord assures us that what we do for the least of our brethren we do for Him. As we look forward to the Jubilee Year, we should imitate God's mercy in the attention and care we offer the most vulnerable.

### St. Mary's hosts CWL Diocesan Convention

PRINCE GEORGE – Oral reports from parish presidents highlighted the first evening of the 59th Annual Diocesan Convention of the Catholic Women's League held at the Diocesan Pastoral Centre, April 10-12.

It is truly amazing what each parish council accomplishes. Though some are small in membership, they do an incredible amount of work in their parish and community. The struggling councils, as well as sick League members, were remembered in prayer throughout the convention.

Rev. Robert Smith, OMI, pastor of St. Mary's Parish, presided at the opening Mass. This year's National theme, "One Heart, One Voice and One Mission". Provincial theme, "Joyfully Serving the Lord", and "With Diocesan theme, Hearts", loined were integrated into Father Smith's homily.

The themes were also woven into the opening remarks given by Provincial

President Pat Deppiesse, Diocesan President Laura Esposito, President of St. Mary's Council (host parish) Susanne LeFebvre and Convention Chairperson Carmen Foucher.

The next day in her talk entitled "CWL Facelift", Pat Deppiesse gave a fun and enthusiastic approach to recruiting new members.

Rev. Jack Michalchuk and John Connelly of the Diocesan Office of Catechesis and Evangelization inspired League members with their presentation, "A Missionary Disciple Today: A Practical Approach to Living One Heart, One Voice, One Mission." They demonstrated the need to listen for God's voice and emphasized that contemplation will transform our lives.

Mary-Anne Lewis Jamin, Chancellor of the Diocese of Prince George, discussed the Safe Parish & Community Policy which is designed to create and maintain a safe environment for parish and diocesan ministry. The process outlined in the policy

involves identifying ministry positions which could put children, youth or vulnerable adults at risk and implementing procedures to prevent their harm.

Bishop Stephen Jensen celebrated the closing Mass and presided over the installation of the new executive. In his remarks as guest speaker at the banquet, Bishop Jesnen spoke about Pope Francis' announcement of the upcoming Year of Mercy, December 8, 2015 to November 2016. Jesus is the face of mercy, he said.



Bishop Sam Jacobs was born in Mississippi. He graduated from The Catholic University of America with Masters Degrees in Philosophy and Education/Administration. Ordained to the priesthood for the Diocese of Lafayette in 1964, he served as pastor, chaplain and associate pastor of several parishes there and in the Diocese of Lake Charles.

Bishop Jacobs served as chairman of the National Service Committee for the Charismatic Renewal and diocesan director of vocations and seminarians for the Diocese of Lake Charles. He also served as the chairman of the US Conference of Catholic Bishops' Ad Hoc Committee on Catholic Charismatic Renewal.

Bishop Jacobs was appointed 10th Bishop of Alexandria in 1989 and was installed as the third Bishop of Houma-Thibodaux in 2003. He retired in October of 2013.

Father Gerald Sekanga recently returned to the Diocese of Nelson after studying Canon Law in Ontario. He works well with youth and has an amazing interest in study. Very much the philosopher with a discerning spirit, Father Sekanga exudes wisdom beyond his years. He is a very popular priest in the Diocese.

The institute is sponsored by the Nelson Diocese Catholic Charismatic Renewal Service Committee and is endorsed by the Catholic Charismatic Renewal Services of BC. Beginning August 9 with Sunday evening Mass,

the institute concludes with lunch on Friday, August 14.

The last part of my sabbatical is characterized by a deeper immersion in the Philippine Church, outreach with victims of Super Typhoon Haiyan, ongoing education and formation with special focus on the use of modern technology in the ministry of evangelization, visits with family and friends, relaxation, adventure and surprises!

### Immersion in the Philippine Church

St. Peter's Parish and Shrine of Leaders in the Diocese of Novaliches, Quezon City became my host parish during my stay in the Philippines during the seasons of Lent and Easter.

I am grateful for the hospitality of Father Marlou Lemaire for allowing me to be a part of their parish community even for a limited but a fruitful time. Celebrating Mass with thousands of people every Sunday is already a unique experience for me; imagine Mass celebrated 16 times every Sunday, six times every day with baptisms, weddings, reconciliation and funerals on a daily basis.

The number of people who attended Mass regularly on Sundays and weekdays demonstrated to me the

human need for spiritual nourishment and a constant relationship with God.

Their love of the Church and sacraments, especially their sincere and humble attitude towards the sacrament of reconciliation, made me think that we need more priests to journey with these people. Indeed the Catholic Church is a wonderful gift of God to his people.

God's work continues through the ministry of the Church and through priests who lead the celebration of the sacraments. Let us pray for more vocations to the priesthood. We need more priests!

I also regularly assisted Father Jun Roxas on Sundays in Parokya, San Pablo Apostol in my home province of Bulacan. It was an opportunity for me to give thanks to this lovely community who were part of my journey towards ordination.

Msgr. Jesus-Romulo Ranada, Vicar General of Novaliches Diocese, also asked me to spend from Holy Week to Easter Sunday at the Visitation of Our Lady Parish, Quezon City. This particular experience of Holy Week and Easter reminded me of the beauty of Filipino religious traditions such as the Salubong procession, the encounter between the resurrected Jesus and his mother.

#### Outreach

After the busyness of Easter Sunday, inspired by the gesture of Pope Francis who visited the victims of Super Typhoon Haiyan in Tacloban, Leyte, I went to Tacloban with three seminarians.

There we visited a family and neighbourhood badly affected by the typhoon and unable to get sufficient help from the government and other charitable agencies. Yes, there are neglected and forgotten people; there are still people who need help.

From our limited resources we were able to give a small amount of relief goods,

rosaries and prayer cards. Let us continue to remember them in our prayers.

### On-going education and formation

With a strong desire to utilize modern technology in the field of evangelization, I registered to study web design and development at Informatics College, Diliman, Quezon City.

When I return to active ministry in Prince George I intend to help improve the use of modern technology and social media in ministry. This is also consistent with the invitation of St. John Paul II who said: "For the Church, the new world of cyberspace is a summons to the great adventure of using its potential to proclaim the Gospel message."

#### **Reunion and visits**

When friends and affiliations knew I was in the country, they took advantage of the opportunity to invite me over, not only for a simple visit but for a particular purpose.

It was a grace-filled experience for me to facilitate a Day of Lenten Recollection with the seminarians of Our Lady of the Angels Seminary, my College Seminary. I also facilitated an Easter Retreat with members of Sta. Monica Cooperative, Inc. in a neighboring town.

These two retreats provided me with personal spiritual renewal. Lourdes College of Bulacan, the school where I finished secondary education, invited me to be their Commencement speaker. It was a humbling experience to face the graduates and share with them the story of my journey.

On two separate occasions, I witnessed the marriage of two of my nieces. As a family, we also celebrated Mother's Day with our mother. This was a very rare opportunity to gather and celebrate with family. I am thankful for all of this.

#### Relaxation and adventure

Every year during my holiday, I spent days away relaxing and rediscovering the beauty of my home country. This time I went to Bagac, Bataan and Baler, Aurora. Parishioners from St. Joseph Parish in Smithers visited me and we went to Las Casas Filipinas de Acuzar in Bagac, Bataan.

The staff of Mary the Queen Parish in Quezon City also invited me to join them for their annual excursion. We went to the beautiful beach of Baler, Aurora. On our way to Tacloban, Leyte I took a side trip to the famous Mayon volcano in Legaspi, Albay. These were enjoyable moments of my sabbatical.

#### Citizenship

While I was away I was thrilled to receive the news that I was invited to write a citizenship test and attend a citizenship oath taking ceremony in

Prince George. In the middle of my time in the Philippines, I flew to Canada.

As of April 15, 2015 I am officially a Canadian Citizen. It brings new feelings of belonging to be a Canadian!

Bishop Stephen Jensen, Father Venerando Sabacan and Dennis Gonia came to the Ramada Inn to join me for the ceremony.

#### **New Appointment**

Days after becoming a new Canadian, Bishop Stephen Jensen made public my pastoral assignment for 2015. I am deeply grateful to Bishop Jensen for his trust and confidence in me as a young priest.

To be appointed Vicar General means I will not have an office of my own but rather share with the Bishop's office, to work with him more closely, to collaborate with him and to represent him. It is his ministry and vision that I will support and help accomplished.

I am very humbled to accept this responsibility, and as I do so, I renew my obedience, loyalty and support to the Bishop. I also ask for my brother priests' support. Please pray for me as I prepare to take on this new ministry.

#### 8th Anniversary of Ordination

On May 18th I marked eight years as an ordained priest for the Diocese of Prince

George. I celebrated it with a Solemn Mass at St. Thomas Chapel, Baranggay Taboc, Angat, Bulacan, the village where I grew up and where I was first called to respond to God's call.

Family, friends, fellow parishioners and visitors from Manila attended. Father Rene Antonio of our Diocese and three other local priests came to join us. A couple visiting from St. Joseph Parish, Smithers was also able to attend.

It was a beautiful celebration and a great time to thank the people who supported me during my formation and throughout the years of my ministry. As I celebrated my eighth anniversary, I give testimony to the words of Pope Francis:

"There is nothing more beautiful for a man than to be called to the priesthood, called to follow Jesus, to be with him, to bring Jesus to others, to bring them his Word and his forgiveness."

I entrust my priestly vocation to the intercession of the Blessed Virgin Mary, our Mother. I look forward to returning soon to the Diocese of Prince George with renewed strength and enthusiasm in the ministry.

COCHRANE – As Mount St. Francis Retreat Centre celebrates its 66th year, we are happy to announce that our new director, Susan Campbell, was formally commissioned to her appointment on March 29.

Ms. Campbell, originally from Edmonton, comes to the Mount with extensive theological and pastoral experience and background. She began her ministry at St. Francis of Assisi Parish, Edmonton, served at Newman Theological College, Edmonton, and latterly was the Director of the Catholic Pastoral Centre for the Diocese of Prince George.

She is also a team member of Returning to Spirit, a reconciliation process between aboriginal and non- aboriginal people working to heal the legacy of the Indian Residential Schools.

Susan's background includes studies at Newman Theological College where she obtained her M.Th, the University of St. Paul (Ottawa) and the Catholic University of Louvain, Blegium where she obtained her M.A. in Religious Studies.

Former director, Friar Kevin Lynch said that Ms. Campbell's hiring was in keeping with the 800-year-old Franciscan tradition of both our founding saints, St. Francis and St. Clare. This tradition calls men and women "to renew the Church which is falling in ruins" – as heard from the cross in San Damiano Chapel of Assisi during a vision St. Francis experienced.

The Mount's mission statement states that "... all are welcome in the name of Christ ... to this spiritual centre of peace, healing and prayer".



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### Archbishop Miller praises D&P

VANCOUVER – "D&P is a great blessing to the Church," Vancouver Archbishop Michael Miller said of the relief and reconstruction work done by Development and Peace in Tacloban, Leyte in the Philippines – hardest hit by the 2013 Typhoon Haiyan.

In his address to the BC/Yukon Council at their April 19th Annual General Meeting at Rosemary Heights Retreat Centre, Archbishop Miller said he was pleased to see first hand the work done by Development and Peace

and its partners in helping rebuild the lives of the people most affected by the typhoon during his first visit to the country last year.

Miller said the work of Development and Peace is a "witness to who we are involved with, and all of us need to be encouraged. Your work in Tacloban has encouraged us and you are doing it successfully."

He said it gave him a "wonderful perspective on what D&P brings – not the kind of agency that walks away after giving aid but stays to help rebuild people's lives."

After the immediate emergency relief, D&P has a three-year reconstruction program in typhoon-hit areas to "support communities in rebuilding infrastructure, as well as strengthening community ties, bolstering local economies and helping communities develop greater resilience for future disasters."

Development and Peace raised over \$13 M in donations nationwide with the Vancouver Archdiocese contributing one of the largest at over \$1 M.



### CWL presents resolutions to BC government

VICTORIA – BC/Yukon Catholic Women's League Resolutions delegation - comprised of President, Pat Deppiesse from North Vancouver, President-elect, Evelyn Rigby from Powell River, Legislation chairperson, Gisela Montague from Chilliwack, and Resolutions chairperson, Dianne Barker from Kamloops - met with MLAs and representatives of the BC Government and opposition in Victoria in May.

Six resolutions of priority to the League and important for our country were presented and expanded upon by the delegates.

Before the presentation to the Liberal caucus, Ralph Sutton (West Vancouver-Capilano) introduced the delegation. In attendance were Honorable Todd Stone (Kamloops South), Jane Thornthwaite (North Vancouver-Seymour), Laurie Throness (Chilliwack-Hope), Pat Pimm (Peace River North), Marvin Hunt (Surrey-Panorama) and Gordon Hogg (Surrey WhiteRock).

The resolutions are:

- I. BC Low Income Dental Care: asks the BC government to provide access to fully subsidized basic dental care for low income citizens
- Electronic or E-Cigarettes: commends the government for passing Bill 14 - Tobacco Control Amendment Act, 2015 regulating sale of e-cigarettes to minors
- Flavored Tobacco Products Ban: requests the government ban flavored tobacco products to protect our children
- 4. National Standard for Newborn-Screening Including Screening for Severe Combined Immunodeficiency: asks the government to include screening for SCID (Severe Combined Immunodeficiency) in its newborn screening protocols

- 5. Children of Missing and Murdered Aboriginal Women: encourages continued participation in the National Roundtable on Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls. While the RCMP Operational Review indicated that the number of missing and murdered women has been reduced, there are still too many murdered and missing women on the Highway of Tears, the 720 km section of Highway 16 between Prince George and Prince Rupert
- 6. Palliative Care An Integral Component of the Canadian Health Care System: affirms the CWL's opposition to euthanasia and assisted suicide, and asks the provincial government to take a leadership role in providing palliative care throughout our province.

Government officials were informed of two resolutions, originating in BC and approved at the World Union of Catholic Women's Organization (WUCWO), that were presented to the United Nations for action.

They were also asked to be vigilant in adherence to the federal Bill C36 which criminalizes the purchase of sexual services.

MLAs asked questions on many of the topics with special attention paid to end of

life care, e-cigarettes and flavored tobacco products and combating other countries trying to create 'the perfect race' through genetic manipulation. Thoughtful discussion took place with the MLAs.

The CWL delegation attended the Speaker's Gallery where Minister Stone introduced them to the House and spoke briefly about the good work done provincially, federally and globally by the Catholic Women's League.

The delegation also met with NDP MLAs Maurine Karagianis (Esquimalt-Royal Roads), Michele Mungall (Nelson-Creston) and Jennifer Rice (North Coast). These MLAs were particularly interested in the resolutions dealing with low income dental care, a ban on flavored tobacco products and children of missing and murdered aboriginal women, topics that are part of the agendas they have been trying to bring to the attention of the government.

While in Victoria the delegation joined BC/Yukon CWL Christian Family Life chairperson, Sharon Geiger of Salmon Arm, in the city's March for Life. Following Mass at St. Andrew's Cathedral with Bishop Gary Gordon, the provincial CWL banner was processed from Centennial Square to the grounds of the Legislature building where a peaceful demonstration in support of the dignity of life took place.

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### The call to nurture missionary parishes

PRINCE GEORGE – All of us have hopes and dreams. It is simply a part of being human. We all want happiness, we all want fulfillment.

Dreams are a way of looking forward to the future.

God also has dreams, dreams for his people, for his Church. But these dreams and visions of God only happen when people like you and I cooperate. Like Mary we need to pray: "Let it be done in me according to your Word."

It is a thought worth contemplating that people like us can actually be instruments in fulfilling God's loving plan on earth today. So the questions we need to ask individually and as a family of faith are: What does God dream for his people today? What is our role in fulfilling these dreams?

Much could be said about this but I will focus on one dream that is coming to the forefront of the Church today. God dreams of renewed parish communities, parishes filled with what Pope Francis calls "missionary disciples".

Imagine parishes that are fully alive in faith, hope and love. Imagine a strong emphasis on evangelization, dynamic faith formation, prayer, adoration, community and social justice.

Imagine people with a deep, intimate, loving relationship with Jesus and a profound sense of mission.

This is the dream that is described to us by our Pope and many bishops, clergy and lay people today. In the document "The Missionary Dynamic of the Parish Today", the Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops quotes the vision of Pope Francis:

"The parish is the presence of the Church in a given territory, an environment for hearing God's word, for growth in the Christian life, for dialogue, proclamation, charitable outreach, worship and celebration.

"In all its activities the parish encourages and trains its members to be evangelizers. It is a community of communities, a sanctuary where the thirsty come to drink in the midst of their journey and a centre of constant missionary outreach. We must admit, though, that the call to review and renew our parishes has not yet sufficed to bring them nearer to people, to make them environments of living communion and participation and to make them completely mission-oriented."

We at the Diocesan Office of Evangelization and Catechesis and the Youth and Young Adult Ministry Office highly recommend some prayer, reflection and dialogue around this important document. We are finding

inspiration in this ongoing dialogue about parish based renewal in the Church today.

We are committed in the coming year to integrating this inspired call for parishes in the wider discussions in our diocese.

All around us we see signs of renewal and hope. Our youth and young adult communities are growing. Many good initiatives both new and old are bearing fruit. People are asking for resources and practical ways to move ahead.

This is a global phenomenon. There are dreams and visions arising in people's hearts. There is a sense that many communities in the Church are awakening and that the inspiring vision of Pope Francis is having a profound effect.

Let us pray often for the Bishop, clergy and laity of this Diocese. May we continue to have the courage and fortitude to dream God's dreams and follow them through. Let us build on the good which already exists and look to the future with hope.

Let us create a shared, open-hearted dialogue of clergy and laity on nurturing our parishes and inspiring them to be fully alive. As the CCCB document says:

"The mission of the parish today is challenging indeed. Yet as Christians, we possess the Good News that our world needs, and is in fact longing for: 'How important it is for our time to discover that God alone responds to the yearning present in the heart of every man and woman!'

The great treasure held within the parish is not any temporal wealth, but rather the living God revealed in Jesus Christ and made present to us by the power of the Holy Spirit, whom the world so desperately needs."





### St. Thérèse teaches the "Little Way"

While attending her first year of university, Carly Weber, a parishioner from St. Mary's Parish, Prince George found herself searching for more. She felt the need to understand her faith more deeply while living in an authentic community. Holiness, which is marked by total trust and confidence in God.

Carly found the School allowed her to develop a closer relationship with Christ. "It was a blessing to be among students and teachers who were supportive of my faith, and who are seeking to grow in

their faith as well. I discovered unhealthy patterns of perfectionism in my life. I know now that I can depend on God for all things, and I don't need to earn his love through my works, abilities, or accomplishments. I strive to trust in Him in the midst of my weakness and battles."

The students at St. Therese gain many foundational life-skills as well as confidence to live in the world as a faithful Catholic and Missionary Disciples — whether they are single, married or join consecrated life.

The cast also included Long John Silver and his merry pirates seeking out their long lost treasure.


