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A DVD for the CWL and You!

A year ago, I was asked to be a guest speaker for the Catholic Women's League Convention for the following summer, in Vancouver, 2015, to speak to their members about the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd. Although honoured to be asked, I had to turn down this invitation to travel, and find a more practical way to send our message and help serve the needs of the CWL members as well as spread the news of what we (CGSAC) do for children.

It became very clear that the best way to use the time scheduled for this talk would be create a DVD to outline our work using photos of children working with materials in atriums across the country. Since many of the CWL members have children and grandchildren, I wanted to give them new hope for their own families and for the future of the church. Knowing these women have personal lives of many ups and downs, in one way or another, I wanted each member to have an experience of relating to scripture. I chose to present the Parable of the Leaven. This parable helps each adult reflect on their place in God's Plan and as a community of women, and helps affirm and encourage their call to God's service.



We filmed it in the atrium at St. Justin Martyrs Parish and copies were flown out to Vancouver to be seen at the convention and to be given to the provincial and regional representatives across Canada.



How One Canadian Bishop Helped CGS Grow!

In 1984, Archbishop Marcel Gervais, along with a small handful of Canadian participants, met Sofia Cavelletti in St. Paul', Minnesota at a CGS Level I, II and III course. He was so impressed with Sofia's work that he invited her to come to Canada.

Archbishop Gervais could see the great need to give Canadian families, who might not have the opportunity to travel for training, a resource to know more about CGS. He wanted a book written so that this "good news" could be shared and asked Patricia Coulter to write The Good Shepherd and The Child, A Joyful Journey.

Patricia wrote the book. Getting it published was difficult and she found that the publishing companies really did not want a book about children's spirituality and felt that it would not be profitable to print. So, the manuscript sat and sat and sat.

I encouraged Patricia to send it to The Salesians of Don Bosco Printing House in New York. As soon as they saw it, they said, "yes" and printed it. Since 1994, it has sold thousands of copies and is in Atriums in 37 countries around the world. Last July, I visited Archbishop Marcel Gervais in Ottawa. I asked him if I could take his picture holding the original book and the new edition. He said, "yes, this is marvellous!"

I was born in England and baptized into the Church of England. I moved to Canada as a child and became a member of St.George's Anglican Church, Brandon, MB.



Although I live in Ottawa, where this summer's National CGS Level 1 Formation Course took place, it took me a six-hour round trip on Highway 7 to get to Holy Redeemer Parish, some 15 km from my home. Fearful lest our two boys would drive my husband crazy on his only week of summer holidays, all four of us headed to my in-laws' cottage in Marmora, where Nana and Papa were going to help my husband adjust to his week as primary caregiver. Then, because I needed the family Jeep to shuttle myself back and forth to Holy Redeemer, I returned to Ottawa myself.

Many of the registrants, who came from as far west as Washington State and as far east as the Canadian Maritimes, had to make similar practical preparations. One woman, a mother of three, even celebrated her birthday with us instead of with her family, who were eight car-hours away. Picnic lunches on the grass outside the church became standard for many of us, with our decision to spend even our breaks together illustrating the genuine affection and mutual respect we developed for each other.

For my part, that fellow-feeling among registrants was a key part of my learning process. Entering the

formation with only a cursory and theoretical understanding of the Montessori method, I was surprised – shocked, really – by the calm and quiet that characterized the presentations. No way, I thought, would my three-year-old (lovely as he is) ever sit still and wait patiently to work with the materials. By the afternoon of day two, I was beginning to feel like oil on water, floating on an understanding of what CGS was supposed to be, but not sounding the depths of its power to speak to and form young children, and certainly not internalizing the information I was receiving as lived and believed-in knowledge. Shy by nature, though, I was not about to object when all my peers seemed to subscribe so whole-heartedly to what we were experiencing.



Imagine my relief, then, to hear a voice protest from the back of the room, "This is all working great here because we're an ideal audience, but do young children really sit still, just watching and listening? I just don't see it working." Laughter and expressions of similar skepticism spread throughout the rows, as we all faced the elephant that I had feared was tramping through only my head space. Okay, I thought, I might be a 'problem student,' but at least I'm not the only one.

By day 3, the long days of formation, the time away from my boys, and the evenings spent reading and reflecting on the day's work were starting to wear on me. So, too, was the emotional and intellectual roller-coaster I had experienced: so enthusiastic about CGS in principle, I had looked forward to formation with weeks of excitement. Then, as my skepticism grew, enthusiasm gave way to disillusionment, and excitement gave way to exhaustion. I



headed to formation Wednesday morning aiming only to get through the day, and hoping that I'd have enough stamina to endure the rest of the week.

Unreceptive as I was, it was that morning that the Holy Spirit opened my eyes to the wonder of CGS. Two moments were key in my transformation. Heather Skublics Lampman (chair of the CGSAC Board), in Ottawa for other reasons, took time out of her schedule to address us at the beginning of the day. She startled me into renewed appreciation of CGS with the near-paradox she voiced: "Remember: CGS is so good, it's worth doing badly." (i.e. with less than perfect resources).



Then, later in the day, Carolyne-Marie Petch provided another light-bulb moment. We were discussing "canned" background music, and one of the leaders shared a story about how a little boy singing along with background music distracted a little girl from her work. The story was meant, as I understood it, to elicit sympathy for the little girl, whose prayer work was repeatedly interrupted by her loud peer, and to demonstrate why silence was preferable to ambient music. Once again, I found myself starting to feel like oil on water, only this time I spoke up to defend the little boy, whose joyful singing was silenced to satisfy the needs of an overly-sensitive child. Why is his singing rather than her sensitivity the problem? Why is background music bad? "Because," Carolyne-Marie interjected, "background music is managed by the adult

instead of by the child, and the atrium exists for the child." Music by and with the children is an essential part of atrium life, I was assured.

These are the two ideas that allowed my conversion to, immersion within, or adoption of all that CGS represents. I don't have quite the words to describe, exactly, the change of mind, heart, and spirit that I experienced, but "a method worth doing badly" and a place that exists for the religious development of the child are things that I can stand behind. The excitement is back, and ten-fold.

"Higher Up and Farther In": Level 2 Training, Vancouver

Before I had even finished my Level 1 course, already I knew I wanted to take the Level 2 course... And Level 3 too. I wanted to get the full picture of where

this Catechesis was going. Initially, I wanted this understanding for myself. But then, observing my own children go through CGS, and working in the Atrium with the children at St Maurice Parish in Ottawa last year, it became unthinkable to me to turn those who would be participating at my home parish away at 6 years of age, when such great things would have begun in them. I needed to take Level 2 so that the children could continue in their growth and formation... I needed to take Level 2 so that the families of these children could also continue in their growth.

Amidst the great work of opening a Level 1 Atrium this summer, I also had the privilege of going to Vancouver for Part A of my Level 2 Formation course. CGSAC granted me a scholarship and my parish paid for my flight.

All that is good and true and beautiful about Level 1 continues in Level 2. For me, it met the next plane of development in my underdeveloped inner child. I learned and experienced many things. Most importantly, it freed me of much judgement I unknowingly carried in my heart. It opened me up to God's love for all people of all time... His desire from the beginning of creation to be all in all. Further, what I learned in Level 2 challenged me to remain in Christ, and to trust that I am enough. My doing is good and important and God wants me to be his co-laborer, but first I must first remain in Him. And He remains in

When I heard there would be a Level 1 course offered this past summer in Ottawa, I invited several people I knew to attend. I told the people I invited that even if they had no intention of ever serving in an Atrium, they should go for the training. I told them they would be changed by what they learned and experienced. I told my mom friends that it would affect the way they

mothered their children. I told my teacher friends that it would impact the way they taught in the classroom. Two women responded to my invitation and went on the training. Both described to me with an uncontainable excitement how they had been changed by what they experienced and learned.

I don't believe it is possible to go on CGS training and not be impacted. If you've done Level 1, you must know what I mean!

I firmly believe that CGS has the potential to transform the engagement of my parish. I believe the program can renew the face of our diocese, can alter the course of our nation, and beyond. But it begins with me. It begins with each of us. We must allow ourselves to be transformed by the Holy Spirit. And surely we know that the Holy Spirit is working through CGS!

Go get your Level 2 training! As C.S. Lewis describes in the The Last Battle go "higher up and further in." You won't be disappointed!
