ADDICTIONS AND MENTAL HEALTH was the theme of this year's CHABC AGM and Conference, held September 19th. Dr. Michael Hryniuk, the keynote speaker, gave the first presentation on the topic: Beyond the Wounded Healer: Henri Nouwen. Mental Health. and the Journey to Spiritual Resilience. His presentation was received with enthusiasm from over 100 people who filled the conference room at the Executive Plaza Hotel in Coquitlam.





Dr. Hryniuk holds a Doctorate in Theology and Personality Theory with over twenty years of experience in spiritual direction, counselling and therapy in private practice. He uses a variety of modalities of healing in a spirituallyintegrated approach to counselling and therapy. The presentation explored Nouwen's vision of the "Wounded Healer" and how these insights can be applied concretely in mainstream clinical practice today. The second presentation of the day was "Impact of the Current Opioid Crisis on Elders in B.C. Issues in Long Term Care" by Dr. Marcus Greatheart. Dr. Greatheart is a family physician in Vancouver with over 25 years experience as a community educator and a Clinical Instructor in the Department of Family Medicine at the University of British Columbia. Dr. Greatheart specializes in addictions, eldercare and LGBT health. In the presentation, Dr. Greatheart discussed the unique challenges faced by long term residents with opioid use disorders and a pilot project that meets Providence Health Care's mission to serve older British Columbians and people with substance misuse disorders.

Scott Harrison gave the third presentation of the day about "SafeCare: Creating and Integrated Care Model for Patient and Staff Safety in the Context of Public Health Emergency". Mr. Harrison is the Director of Urban Health, Indigenous Health, Substance Use, Maternity and NICU for Providence Health Care in Vancouver, BC. He has over 25 years experience of clinical nursing and leadership experience and is Masters trained in advanced nursing practice with experience in both the UK and Canadian heath care systems. In response to the overdose crisis, the Urban Health program led by Mr. Harrison created the Safe Care Program which helps provide life saving harm reduction and treatment to people who use substances while supporting staff to deliver the services safety.

FLU SEASON

This year is predicted to be a very bad one for the flu virus, based on the early experience in Australia. Research has shown that seniors are at much higher risk of complications from the flu and in the 2014/15 season accounted for 70% of flu-related hospitalizations and 91% of flu related deaths.



"Why is that?", you may ask. Adults aged 65 and older are more severely affected by flu because:

- 1. The immune system becomes weaker with age
- 2. They have less ability to fight the infection
- 3. The flu can worsen pre-existing conditions such as diabetes or renal disease
- 4. In some cases, the flu may significantly reduce ability to perform normal activities such as walking, dressing and eating independently

Having the flu shot is considered the most effective method to prevent the flu.

Also, for seniors, the standard flu vaccine does not work as effectively as it does in younger adults. As we age, our body's ability to develop immunity is significantly reduced. There is a solution available that is not yet funded by the government in BC although it is provided to seniors in other provinces.

It is called High Dose Flu vaccine and it contains the same antigens as the standard vaccine but with four times the amount. This increases the effectiveness of the vaccine in seniors by 24 to 35% above the standard vaccine. The vaccine is available at London Drugs and Save-on Pharmacies for \$75 and if you have an extended health plan, you may also be eligible for par tial or full coverage, depending on your plan.

Ask your doctor what he or she recommends for you but whatever you do, please make sure you get vaccinated. The standard vaccine is still better than not getting vaccinated.

SPIRITUAL CARE TRAINING

The CHABC is embarking on a new program to expand the ability of parishes to train pastoral visitors with the intent of developing pastoral care visitation teams in each parish. These teams would coordinate visits to members of the parish who may be frail and not able to get out often or they may be alone and lonely, or they may have health problems that prevent them from leaving their home.



In some cases, they may be individuals who have been moved to a long-term care home and have nobody to visit them. The training in this program is excellent for staff who work in a care home or hospital, for individuals caring for loved ones in their home or for people who visit with seniors in their homes or care homes. Many attendees have commented that it has been an enormous help to them just in understanding how to better communicate with family members and friends.

The focus of the program will be to start by offering the training to parishes who have the support to start a home pastoral visitation program. By training individuals from parishes to facilitate the training, we will vastly expand our ability to train large numbers of people throughout the province the training consists of eight 2.5 hour sessions. NEW! Health Ethics Guide Sponsor and Board Formation and Learning App

As announced during the recent CHAC Conference in Banff, a new interactive learning app on the *Health Ethics Guide* is now available for free on both the Apple App Store (for iPhones) and the Google Play store (for Android phones).

- 1. To access the app using an iPhone, navigate from your phone to the App Store. And within the search window, search "Health Ethics Guide Module". You can then download the app by clicking the 'GET' icon or the 'cloud' icon.

Developed by Covenant Health with support from Catholic Health of Alberta, the app features personal interviews of Alliance Governing Council and other leaders in Catholic health care, including key articles, principles, and practical applications of the Guide. It is intended to guide sponsors and boards in exercising their roles and accountabilities to ensure the ethical integrity of their sponsored works, but is accessible to broader audiences, both within and external to Catholic health care.

Given the complex and often nuanced ethical issues we face in Catholic health care today, sponsors will benefit from a deeper exploration of the rich ethical and theological tradition upon which the Guide is based. With its user-friendly format, case studies, and content testing questions, the app serves as a formation experience of this moral tradition, and its relevance in guiding decision-making at both the clinical bedside and board table.



HOSPICE ORGANIZATIONS MUST NOT BE FORCED TO DO EUTHANASIA

In February 2018 the <u>board of the Delta BC Hospice Society was given an edict from Fraser Health</u> to provide euthanasia (MAiD). At that time, the board refused to comply and continued its good work.

Recently, the <u>newly elected board re-stated its opposition to euthanasia</u>. They passed a resolution stating:

"MAiD is not compatible with the Delta Hospice Society purposes stated in the society's constitution, and therefore, will not be performed at the Irene Thomas Hospice."

The <u>Delta Optimist newspaper</u> reported on December 7 that Fraser Health informed the Delta Hospice Society that their position is at odds with the policy of Fraser Health.

A spokesperson for Fraser Health told the *Delta Optimist* that:

"...it fully supports a patient's right to receive medical assistance in dying wherever they may be, including in a hospice setting."

If funding for their 10 bed hospice is stopped, people in the community requiring care at the end of life will lose the excellent care the hospice provides.

By forcing the Delta Hospice Society to provide euthanasia, Fraser Health is also redefining the meaning of hospice/palliative care.

In its recent Call to Action (Nov 27, 2019), the Canadian Hospice Palliative Care Association and the Canadian Society of Palliative Care Physicians stated that MAiD (euthanasia) is <u>not</u> a part of hospice palliative care (taken from https://www.chpca.net/chpcacspcp):

"MAiD is not part of hospice palliative care; it is not an 'extension' of palliative care nor is it one of the tools 'in the palliative care basket'. National and international hospice palliative care organizations are unified in the position that MAiD is not part of the practice of hospice palliative care.

...Hospice palliative care sees dying as a normal part of life and helps people to live and die well. Hospice palliative care does not seek to hasten death or intentionally end life."

If the Delta Hospice Society is forced to provide euthanasia then all hospice palliative care organizations within Canada could also be forced to provide it.

This petition is directed to Dr. Victoria Lee, President of Fraser Health Authority and to the Hon. Adrian Dix, BC Minister of Health, to oppose forcing the Delta Hospice Society to provide euthanasia.

Hospice/palliative care is not MAiD. The Society must not be forced to provide MAiD. Fraser Health is overstepping its role as a health authority in forcing and bullying them to provide MAiD.
